Work Continues On Chapel

It is exciting to see the progress that is continually happening on the chapel project at Park River Bible Camp.

More things have happened since the last issue of the *Proclaimer*. As this is being written, the building is almost completely enclosed. That means most of the new doors and windows have been installed.

Have you ever shingled in the winter? Construction workers have done that here. The new part has been shingled now as well as much of the old building.

Recently the top of the bell tower was attached. The old base had to be demolished because of some rotten wood, but we were fortunate to be able to preserve the distinct looking top portion. A new look to the building is the attachment of a log entry way to the southwest edge of the office wing (see the picture on page 2).

Things are starting to take shape on the inside too. Electrical work, insulation, framing, and sheetrocking have been going on.

As we see progress, we continue to be thankful for the John Paulson estate. We are also thankful for gifts that have been given to the Capital Campaign Fund and pray for God's continued provision of gifts to finish the project.

"Rise Up!" New Orleans Missions Trip

In the spring of 1997 the Red River of the North overflowed its banks, flooding the city of Grand Forks. Anyone who saw the carnage witnessed the devastation of the river. They also saw the strength of our people as we came together to clean up and rebuild what had been lost. Our strength is still needed.

In August of 2005 Hurricane Katrina laid waste hundreds of miles along the Gulf Coast, causing over 80 billion dollars in damage and claiming over 1,800 lives. The levees of New Orleans were breached in about twenty different places and as a result, 80% of the city was flooded. Although many relief organizations have come to the scene, the

rebuilding is still going on, and more hurricanes have caused devastation. Many people's lives are still in tatters, and many homes are still ruined. Our countrymen to the south need our help.

Consequently, the Bible Camp is organizing a Men's Mission Trip to New Orleans for young men, college age to about 40, although men over 40 are also welcome. We will drive to Minneapolis and fly from there on Saturday, March 14th and return on Saturday, March 21st. When we are in New Orleans we will build, clean up and do what we can to

help people who need it. We will not be able to fix everything in just one week, but together we can make a dif-

ference.

We will be staying at Camp Restore, whose purpose is to restore faith, home and community to victims of hurricanes. The cost to stay is only \$25 a day (\$175 for the week). Meals are included in this cost. To keep your cost of flying down, please contact us as soon as possible if you would like to participate. The Western Walsh County Ministerium has already contributed funds to bring the cost down for everyone.

If you are unable to go but still wish to help in this mission, consider paying for someone else to go or providing a gift to make it easier for several people.

"I Will Build You A House"

In 2 Samuel 7 God makes a covenant with King David. David lived in a nice house and Israel had peace. David was thankful, so he said to the prophet Nathan, "I dwell in a house of cedar but the ark of God dwells in a tent." David wanted to build a temple for God.

It sounded like a good idea to Nathan, so he told David to do it. But God had a different idea, and, since Nathan was a prophet, God told him about it. This was the message for David: "Would you build me a house to dwell in? ... In all the places where I have moved with all the people Israel, did I speak a word with any of the judges of Israel, saying, 'Why have you not built me a house of cedar?' ... I took you from the pasture, from following the sheep, that you should be prince over my people Israel." God went on to list more things He had done for David and even more things He was yet to do. Finally He said, "I will make you a house."

What? Isn't that what David said he wanted to do for God? Indeed, but God's response was, "No." David wanted to bless God, but God chose to bless David in-

stead (God did eventually let David's son, Solomon build the temple, but that's another story). In promising to build a "house" for David, God meant David's royal family, his descendants who would rule after him.

God went on to say, "Your house and your kingdom shall be made sure forever before me. Your throne shall be established forever." History tells us that an everlasting kingdom is unique. We see kingdoms and systems of government last a short time and get overthrown. Royal dynasties may last for hundreds of years, but that is a long way from forever. An earthly kingdom could conceivably last until the end of the world at the most, but even that is not what God promises to David!

An eternal kingdom requires something unique, an eternal king, and that is exactly what God had in mind. God's covenant with David resulted in the covenant He gives to us, His great promises of forgiveness and new life. Jesus Christ, a descendant of David and eternal ruler of God's people, fulfills both covenants. He is the eternal King in David's line, and He is our Savior, Ruler, and Shepherd.
